

## Green Canyon High School Community Council 10, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 am.

Kristy Marshall moved to accept the minutes from the March meeting; Monica Edelmayer seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous to accept the meetings from the March meeting.

Tessa Swenson gave us an update on Green Canyon Gives Back . It is still scheduled for April 29th. We are still looking for donations for door prizes and have a few spaces for booths. If anyone knows of any organization that would like to man a booth and provide information or an activity for attendees, they can sign up with the office. Council members were asked to take posters and reminder cards and distribute them to the community.

Jared Storrs reported on the FFA project that collected donations for those affected by flooding in Nebraska. The students organized the project and collected and loaded donations. Jared and his family drove the trailer to Nebraska and distributed the items to flood victims near Grand Island. He reported that the donations were greatly appreciated and it was a good experience for all involved, particularly the students we helped with the project.

Elections for next year's School Community Council will be held before school is out. A letter will be going out to parents and nominations will be accepted through April 26th. The election will be held electronically. We are looking to fill six positions next year.

Dave Swenson presented the 2019-2020 School Trustland Plan for council approval. Our two goals will be 1) Improve Curriculum-Instruction-Assessment, particularly in areas of growth and English learners and 2) Provide a safe, positive academic environment for At-Risk Learners. After reviewing the proposed plan, we voted 13-0 to accept the plan.

Randy Bennion gave us a presentation on school safety. We watched an animated representation of the Parkland, FL school shooting. Lessons learned included the following:

- Locked doors are typically not breached
- People who hide out of sight have a better chance to survival
- Students who ran had a better chance of survival

We train staff and students to Run-Hide-Fight. In the event of a situation, they are to lock doors and get out of sight.

Next year we are changing our off-site evacuation site to the RSL building. It is easier to control, an inside location, and it will be easier to facilitate reunification. We are also going to work on supplying blankets (for warmth and to help with shock).

Suggestions were made to somehow provide basic first aid instruction to help in the event of an emergency and to somehow provide parents with information on ongoing school safety training and plans.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:10 am.
