Since Sky View was formed five years ago, it has constantly been pushed ahead toward its goal-becoming better than the best. The man who was responsible for the changes and progress at Sky View was Principal Kenneth Webb. Most of the students knew him as a warm, friendly human being who was sincerely interested in them. A countless number of times he told the studentbody, "If you have got a problem, come and see me, and we'll see what we can do together to solve it."

Most students only knew what Principal Webb had accomplished while he had been at Sky View. Few knew what the man Kenneth Webb had accomplished. He was an elementary principal, a junior high principal, and an assistant superintendent of Cache County schools. In 1968 he was one of eight educators chosen from the United States to travel to India to help them with their school system. This year he served as chairman of Region one.

This man believed in Sky View. He often said, "If we are to maintain our place among the great high schools of the state and nation, we all must believe in the potential of Sky View."

[^0]One of the busiest men in the school was Vice-Principal Irel Eppich. His assignment was student activities. These ranged from preparing halftime and pre-game shows to helping with the discipline of the school. If a class or a club were preparing an assembly or sponsoring a dance, Mr. Eppich was the man they consulted. He also worked with the Executive and coordinating councils and the Student Senate.

A new vice-principal was added to Sky View's administration this year. Leon West came to Sky View because he "liked to work with kids". He found ample opportunity to help students. He was in charge of pep assemblies, graduation, class reunions, ninth grade orientation, publications, and attendance. Representing the district office, Mr. West was the area supervisor in charge of several subject areas. He was also the director of the summer school.

## CUSTODIANS

Plumber, brick layer, electrician, carpenter and locker opener described the Sky View custodians. Seven men and one woman worked hard forty-four hours a week to keep the building spotless and warm.

Sky View students consumed 300 pounds of potatoes, 150 pounds of roast beef, 10,000 pounds of sugar, 250 pounds of butter, and 150 pounds of flour every week. The cooks worked eight hours a day to feed between 800 and 900 students nutritious and appetizing meals. The foods the students liked best included chili, barbecues, seaburgers, tacos and pizza.
Hail nor rain nor dark of night nor noisy students could keep Sky View bus drivers from making their rounds. Thirty-nine devoted men spent nearly three hours a day transporting Sky View students to and from school. These men enjoyed their work and did it because they thought it was "interesting".

## BUSINESS

Key punch, selectric typewriters, off-set duplicators and a new dictation lab were added to the business department this year. At the beginning of the second semester this department moved into the new vocational building. Open classrooms helped create an atmosphere similar to that of an office. Type, shorthand, notehand, business machines and a business block class were just some of the areas that trained the students for their future vocations.

## VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

Sky View's new Vocational Center, started last spring, was dedicated on Feb. 10, 1969, with Governor Calvin L. Rampton as guest speaker.

The building was used by students and adults in business, electronics and auto mechanics. Students in classrooms could be observed in all sections, for each of the classrooms had been constructed with just three walls. The desks and business machines were like those found in offices. The electronics area had transistors and radio stations where students frequently talked with people all over the world. The guess work was taken out of auto mechanics in the new modern "garage" where overall-clad boys got working knowledge in this field everyday. The 20,000 square foot shop accommodated eighteen cars. Because of the many facilities it offered, the Vocational Center promised to play a big part in Cache Valley, as well as at Sky View.

Sky View's multi media center was a farcry from yesterday's library. Equipped with 7,000 hard back books and 1,500 paperbacks, the library also had movies, single concept loop films, film strips, transparencies, tapes, and records.

The library offered to the students 125 magazine subscriptions, many filed for 5 years. The storage of the no longer current material was solved by the
addition of micro-films. A copy of any material on the film could be made by a unique machine, the micro-film readerprinter. This machine was one of the two in Utah high schools. According to one of the 3 M equipment representatives, Sky View was definitely one of the leaders in the establishment of a media center.

By chance, he meets Juliet, Capulet's daughter, and at first sight they fall in love with each other. But Juliet's cousin, the quarrelsome Tybalt, witnesses the meeting and seeks out Romeo. Romeo, who is returning from his secret marriage to Juliet has no desire to fight Tybalt. Romeo's friend Mercutio takes up the quarrel and is killed at Romeo's intervention. Enraged, Romeo takes up the fight, kills Tybalt, and is banished from the kingdom of Verona.

Juliet's father, knowing nothing of her marriage to Romeo, insists that she marry the Count Paris and sets the marriage date. In desperation, Juliet goes to Friar Laurence for help. He gives her a potion that will make her appear to be dead. She takes it the night before she is to be married, and, thinking her dead, her family puts her in the Capulet tomb. Meanwhile, Friar Laurence sends a letter to Romeo telling him of the plan. But by unlucky chance, the letter does not reach Romeo, and thinking Juliet dead, he goes to the tomb and kills himself. When Juliet wakes up, she finds her lover dead and kills herself with Romeo's knife.
